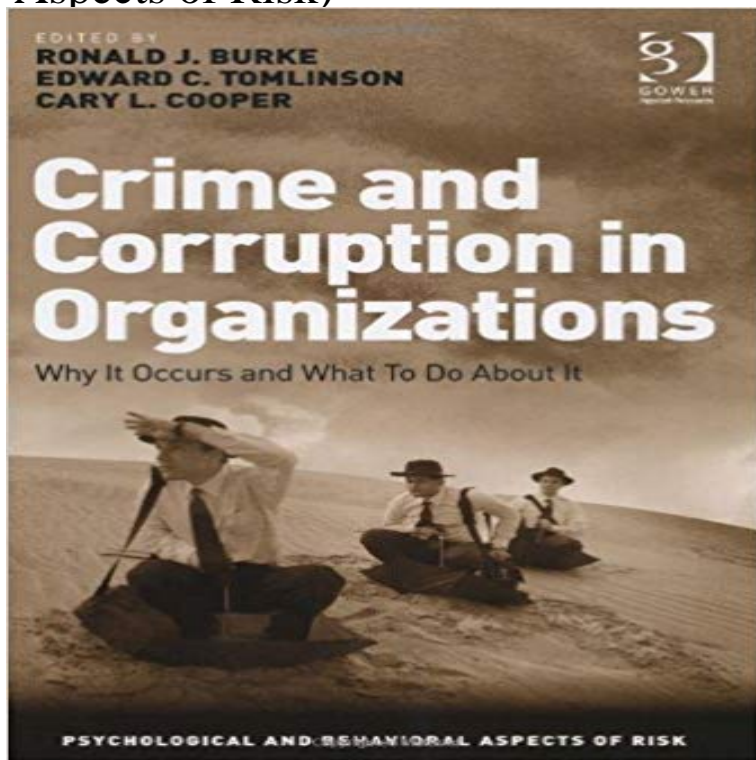


Crime and Corruption in Organizations (Psychological and Behavioural Aspects of Risk)
